





While president,

own suits.




James Buchanan


William Taft was the largest president in American history. He once got himself wedged into the White House bathtub and had to call his advisers to lift him out.




Herbert Hoover's son had two pet alligators, which were occasionally allowed to run loose around the White House.




Chester A. Arthur,

their hands in marriage.




James Garfield write

As sheriff of Erie County, N.Y., Grover Cleveland twice had to spring the trap at a hanging. This earned him the nickname "Buffalo Hangman."




A small tumor removed from the roof of Grover's mouth can be found at the Mutter Museum in Philadelphia.

light switches himself.




calvin Coolidge

He finished the 90-minute speech with the bullet still firmly in his chest.






Eisenhower helped popularize golf. He installed a putting green at the White House and played at least 800 rounds while in office - more than any other president.




On Sept. 2, 1944, George
